THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Lesson Jeremiah 31:31-34

Reader A reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Second Lesson Hebrews 5:5-10

Reader A reading from the Epistle to the Hebrews.

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Readings for the Year of the Bible

This week's readings take us to the halfway point in the psalter, the fancy name for the collection of psalms. Yes, it's a long book. The 90's band House of Pain told us as much when they said, "I've got more rhymes than the Bible's got psalms."

Sunday, March 17: Psalms 43-49 (Day 164): Psalm 42 began Book II of the Psalter. Psalm 43 is used by your priest and acolytes in the sacristy as part of the preparation for celebrating Mass.

Monday, March 18: Psalms 50-55 (Day 165): Psalm 51 is one of the classic psalm of lament: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your loving-kindness." By tradition, it was composed by King David after the prophet Nathan confronted him following his adultery with Bathsheba.

Tuesday, March 19: Psalms 56-61 (Day 166): Lots of lamenting: individually by an Israelite, corporately by Israel, and one by a king.

Wednesday, March 20: Psalms 62-68 (Day 167): "For God alone my soul in silence waits" (Ps 62). The very definition of quiet confidence in the saving power of God.

Thursday, March 21: Psalms 69-72 (Day 168): The psalms show up in the New Testament all over the place, none more than Psalm 69, quotes from which are in all four gospels, Acts, two epistles, and Revelation.

Friday, March 22: Psalms 73-77 (Day 169): These psalms are attributed to Asaph, the chief musician of the Temple, appointed by King David. Psalm 73 begins Book III of the psalter.

Saturday, March 23: Psalms 78-80 (Day 170): History in verse: Psalm 78 recounts God's faithfulness, and Israel's shortcomings, during the time of the Exodus.



The text comes from the 5th c. and is known as St. Patrick's Breastplate. The music by Rutter uses much sequence and a repeated rhythm in each measure. The overall melodic pattern rises gradually to a high point at the word "love" before falling back to the original pitch.
