Readings for the Year of the Bible

The prophet's condemnation of the nations, alongside Israel itself, gives way to a prophecy of a brighter future for all: a righteous king, a peaceful future, a promise of renewal, and ultimately the coming of that glorious age that the final book of the Bible, Revelation, assures the faithful is coming at the end. Isaiah is quoted extensively in Revelation.

Sunday, April 21: Isaiah 12-14 (Day 199): Isaiah 13 begins the second section of the book (chapters 13-23), which tell of the Lord's judgment of the nations.

Monday, April 22: Isaiah 15-19 (Day 200): Prophecies against Moah, Damascus, Ethiopia, and Egypt.

Tuesday, April 23: Isaiah 20-24 (Day 201): After prophecies against Babylon, Edom, Arabia, Jerusalem, Tyre and Sidon, chapter 24 introduces the idea of a global judgment, beginning section three.

Wednesday, April 24: Isaiah 25-28 (Day 202): Sometimes called the "Isaiah Apocalypse," these chapters foretell God's judgment of a corrupt world, and his salvation for the faithful remnant.

Thursday, April 25: Isaiah 29-31 (Day 203): In the fourth section of the book (beginning in chapter 28), Isaiah conveys six messages of judgment against Israel.

Friday, April 26: Isaiah 32-34 (Day 204): A condemnation of surrounding nations (chapters 32-33) and a message of blessing for Israel (34-35).

Saturday, April 27: Isaiah 35-37 (Day 205): The fifth section contains historical information about the siege of Jerusalem under Sennacherih and the deliverance by the Lord.

Music Notes: Today's anthem is a lively chorus from The Messiah oratorio that Handel wrote in only 3 weeks. The text is from Isaiah 53:6. Note how the music goes in opposite directions at the words "have gone astray" and peters out at the end. For "we have turned" Handel writes a musical turning motive in fast sixteenth notes. The final section slows down dramatically with the important message of Easter, and ends solemnly in a minor mode.

Anyone who would like to sing an anthem or play an instrumental piece during the summer months is welcome to do so. Please let Lou Carol Fix know of your interest and we will find a date for you to share your musical talents during a Sunday service. Beginners are welcome! Dates range from June 16 through September 1.
