THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Lord speaks to us in scripture and preaching about how He has saved all humankind from the power of death by raising His Son to life again. We respond proclaiming our belief, praying for the world, and greeting one another in His Name.

First Lesson

Acts 8:26-40

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what

you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Second Lesson

Reader A reading from the First Epistle General of St. John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed

1 John 4:7-21

among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Sermon

Readings for the Year of the Bible

In Isaiah, there is a stark division between chapters 1-39 and chapters 40-66. Beginning in chapter 40, the text looks toward Babylon, which overthrew Assyria, conquered Judah, and destroyed Jerusalem in 587 BC. Chapters 40–55, sometimes called "The Book of the Consolation of Israel," are addressed to the Hebrew exiles in Babylon. Here the hopeful theme of imminent restoration replaces the message of impending doom that characterized the first half of the book. The New Testament picks up on this language extensively to describe life in the kingdom of God, the New Jerusalem.

Sunday, April 28: Isaiah 38-40 (Day 206): In 38-39, a prose account is given of the Assyrian king Sennacherib's siege of Jerusalem while Hezekiah was king (approximately 704 BC). Chapter 40 begins the second main section of Isaiah with "Comfort, comfort my people, says your God."

Monday, April 29: Isaiah 41-43 (Day 207): After judgment comes the mercy of God, the theme of the latter part of Isaiah, written for the captives in Babylon.

Tuesday, April 30: Isaiah 44-46 (Day 208): Isaiah predicts that Cyrus the Great, founder of the Persian Empire, will function as the Lord's "anointed" and deliver Israel.

Wednesday, May 1: Isaiah 47-49 (Day 209): Isaiah taunts "Queen Babylon," then reassures "Lady Zion," of God's comfort and favor. Chapter 49 includes the second of four "Servant Songs" with imagery that looks forward to the life of Jesus.

Thursday, May 2: Isaiah 50-52 (Day 210): Isaiah conveys God's encouragement to his faithful people and calls Israel to be ready for the coming of the Lord.

Friday, May 3: Isaiah 53-56 (Day 211): The fourth and final Servant Song develops the theme of the Suffering Servant ("Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows").
