

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Lord speaks to us in scripture and preaching about how He has saved all humankind from the power of death by raising His Son to life again. We respond proclaiming our belief, praying for the world, and greeting one another in His Name.

First Lesson Acts 1:15-17, 21-26

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred twenty persons) and said, "Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through

David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus—for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry. So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

Those who believe in the Son of God have the testimony in their hearts. Those who do not believe in God have made him a liar by not believing in the testimony that God has given concerning his Son. And this is the testimony: God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life.

I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. On Thursday, May 30, at 12 p.m., we observe the Feast of Corpus Christi ("Body of Christ"), a celebration of the real presence of Christ in the bread and wine of the Eucharist. A special luncheon will follow.

St. George's hosts a ward of the Confraternity of the Blessed Sacrament, whose members pray each day for the Church and the world, normatively in the presence of the Sacrament.



Readings for the Year of the Bible

The selections from Jeremiah this week continue their focus on judgment against Judah. Beginning in Chapter 26, however, we find personal information about the prophet, as he describes his life before the fall of Jerusalem. (It wasn't great.) Through most of his book, Jeremiah has been majoring on judgment and minoring on blessing. In the four chapters, 30-33, he majors on blessing and minors on judgment, in what is called the "Book of Consolation."

Sunday, May 12: Jeremiah 15-17 (Day 220): Jeremiah despairs; then, his seventh sermon concerns what he is to do (encourage, exhort) – and not do (marry or be merry).

Monday, May 13: Jeremiah 18-21 (Day 221): Jeremiah is instructed to engage in a symbolic action: visiting the potter's house. Jeremiah travels from potter's house to prison stocks after annoying a short-tempered priest (aren't we all?).

Tuesday, May 14: Jeremiah 22-24 (Day 222): Jeremiah tells the story of four godless Judean kings, then criticizes Judah's politicians, prophets, and priests.

Wednesday, May 15: Jeremiah 25-27 (Day 223): A prophecy of the 70 years of captivity in Babylon, followed by an oracle of judgment, comparing the Lord's wrath to a cup of wine.

Thursday, May 16: Jeremiah 28-30 (Day 224): After dispatching the prophet Hananiah, Jeremiah records the contents of three letters sent to the exiles in Babylon. He tells them to make themselves comfortable.

Friday, May 17: Jeremiah 31-32 (Day 225): Chapters 30-33 are known as the "Book of Consolation," a departure from Jeremiah's usually gloomy communications.

Saturday, May 18: Jeremiah 33-36 (226): An oracle of judgment against kings Zedekiah and Jehoiakim.
